PLANNING A CAMPFIRE

When planning a campfire, think about:

- the age of the girls
- the repertoire of the girls (don't teach more than 1 or 2 new songs)
- how long the campfire will be (not more than 10 or 12 songs at the most)
- where the campfire will be (inside? Outside? Can the campfire participants see and hear you clearly?)
- the event (a camp? A unit campfire? A large District event?)
- the theme you are incorporating (if any)

One person should be the campfire leader and should bridge the gaps between the songs. If different people are leading different songs, the campfire leader keeps track of who is leading which song and cues the song leaders at the appropriate times.

The shape of your campfire should follow the shape of a fire.

- at the beginning, when the fire is just beginning, sing a campfire opening such as Fire's Burning, Tall Trees, Tsoona Campfire Opening or Sussex Campfire Opening. This draws people into the circle of the campfire and focuses them on the campfire.
- while the fire is building, sing 3 or 4 happy songs and rounds. Examples are: Kookaburra, As We Trek Along, Jamaica Farewell, Something to Sing About, Tzena, Heidi
- when the fire is at its peak, sing 2 or 3 action songs, yells, chants, and maybe some singing games. This is when the campfire is at is loudest. Examples are: Dutch Shoe Game, Tongo, TIRO, Lu La, the Girl Guide Cookie Chant, Chinese Fan, My Hat, My Mother Gave Me. If the participants have prepared skits, this is where the skits would go.
- as the fire begins to die, sing one or two more rounds or fun songs to bring the energy level down a bit
- then, shift to 2 or 3 quiet or thoughtful songs. Examples are: Bantu Echo Song, Bell Yodel, Ira Congo, Kumba Yah, Land of the Silver Birch, Barges, Peace I Ask of Thee O River, No Man is an Island, Whene'er You Make a Promise
- here, you may wish to add a thoughtful story or reading for the participants to take away with them.
- finally, close the campfire with vespers, such as Zulu Farewell, Light the Stars, Creina Good Night or Breton Fisherman's Prayer
- a campfire should always end with Taps (daylight or evening version, as appropriate)
