What We're Doing

Letter of the week:

The letters for the month of October are E, F, G and H.

Each week we do the following activities with the letter of the week:

- Trace the letter
- Identify words that begin with that better
- Draw pictures of objects that begin with that letter (for display in classroom)
- Write the letter independently

Writing:

Each week the students draw a picture and write a story on a specified topic (e.g. "Draw a picture and write a story about something that starts with the letter D"). At this point, most students are dictating their stories to a teacher, who writes the words. This models the writing process.

Encourage your child to write for different reasons. Don't worry if there are real letters included in the "writing" at all! This is just to get your child used to the idea that he can write. Here are some ideas:

- Dictate a shopping list to him (have your "real' list available out of sight.
- Write a letter or make a card for a family member.

Reading:

In reading this month, we will be reading fiction stories and working on the following:

- Connecting prior knowledge/experience to what is read
- Identifying the sequence of events in a story
- Identifying the characters in a story
- Fantasy vs. reality (what could not really happen, vs. what could really happen)

What You Can Do

Letter of the week:

- During the course of the day/evening with your child, ask your child to find and point to a given letter in his environment (e.g. "Can you find the letter "E" in the Home Depot sign?")
- Ask your child, and help him if necessary, to name a word that begins with a given letter.

Writing:

Make sure your child is holding the writing instrument correctly. It should be gripped equally between the thumb, forefinger and side of the middle finger. This position offers the best flexibility and control over the writing instrument.



Reading:

Read! Let your child tell you about his thoughts during the story. I know this can take FOREVER, but it's really good for him! Encourage him to share his experiences that are alike or different to the events in the story.

Also, watching a TV show or movie with your child can help him begin to identify the sequence of events and characters in any story. Just ask him what came first? Then what? What happened at the end? Who was



What We're Doing

Shapes:

Identify, describe and match 2- and 3- dimensional objects: triangle, rectangle, oval, diamond, semicircle, sphere, cube, pyramid, cylinder, cone.

- One-to-one correspondence (counting one number to one object)

What You Can Do

Shapes:

Practice drawing shapes.

Point out examples of shapes in your environment.

Practice counting one number to one object at home.

What we're doing

Social Skills:

- 1. Saying Assalamu alaikum when entering and leaving a room, and responding to others with wa alaikum assalam.
- 2. Interacting with adults and peers in an appropriate manner.
- 3. Cooperative behavior such as taking turns,

What von can do

Social Skills:

- 1. Practice saying assalamu alaikum and wa alaikum assalam. at appropriate times.
- 2. Practice good manners at home: use "may J" questions, use 'please', 'thank you' and 'your welcome.'
- 3. Encourage your child to use cooperative behavior



Islamic Studies

What we're doing

Qur'an:

Surah Al-Fatihah, ayahs 4-7. We practice one ayah per week.

Ramadan:

We are talking about Ramadan as a Muslim month that we do special things in:

- 1. Fast
- 2. Share with the noor

What you can do

Qur'an:

Recite Surah Al-Fatihah for your child every day, perhaps as part of a bedtime routine. If she already knows it, or can say part of it with you or alone, have her do so.

Ramadan:

Include your child in any part of Ramadan activity that you can. Let her help prepare Iftar and pray with you. She can also go shopping



What we're doing

Health and Safety:

- 1. Fire Prevention and Safety: The West Chester Fire Department visited JNTAC on Monday, October 2. The firefighters talked to us about fire prevention and safety in case of a fire. We are continuing to learn about how to prevent fires and how to stay safe in case of a fire.
- 2. Car Safety: We will be learning about how to travel safely in cars and be safe around cars. This includes first and foremost, appropriate safety restraints for children. Be on the lookout for more information on this. You can also check the following web site:

3. Stranger Danger: Strangers are people we don't know. Since we don't know them, we don't know if they are good or bad. Bad strangers don't usually look bad — usually they look good. For this reason, it is important for children to know that a stranger is someone they do not know.

Also, we often teach children that they should ignore their natural inhibition of strangers, and that they should hug and hiss any person that we want them to, or that wants a hug or hiss.

In preschool, we teach our students to be appropriately social and polite without ignoring their natural inhibitions. We also teach them how to stay safe from bad strangers when out and about and when at home.

4. Safety at home and school: We will be covering a few aspects of home and school safety, including avoiding electrical outlets, kitchen safety, poisons, choking hazards, and more.

What you can do

Health and Safety:

- 1. Fire Prevention and Safety:
 - Involve your child in checking smoke detectors
 - Make and <u>practice</u> a family escape plan.
 - Visit the fire department in your area.

2. Car Safety:

- Make a short list of rules for safety in the car.
- Buckle up yourself, and buckle up your child in an appropriate child safety restraint!!
- 3. Stranger Danger:

For more information on how to protect your child from abduction, I would suggest a Google search on "stranger danger." I found many web sites on the topic.

- 4. Safety at home and school:
 - Child proof your home! Involve your child in the process. As you plug outlets and move cords out of reach, talk to your child about why you are doing it.
 - Remind your child that if they see something dangerous, they should tell an adult or parent, not try to fix it or remove the danger themselves.

Homework

Occasionally we have work that we don't get to in class, and so we send home these extra pages as "homework." This is not required work. It is to be done ONLY if your child is interested and wants to. Please do not force your child to do this work.

At that point, it will be the parent's choice to pick up extra worksheets for their child if they so wish.

Picture Day

Picture Day is October 17! This is a NO UNJFORM day. Please send your child in the clothes you would like her to wear for her picture. Please send her in gym shoes, though, as we will still be playing that day (the shoes do not show in the picture!).

Those students who attend only on Tuesday and Thursday may join us for the picture taking part of the day. They should remain with their parents while waiting. I will try to let you know the exact timing of our photo session.

Gym shoes and paint smocks:

Please make sure your child is wearing GYM SHOES every day, including Wednesdays (no uniform day). Sandals of any kind or party shoes are not the safest gear for running and playing.

We still have some students who do not have paint smocks to wear when we paint. We do have some extras in our art center, but your child should have his own smock. We are sure you are interested in protecting your child's uniform when he paints.

Field Trip

We will be going to the Heritage Village Museum on November 11, inshaAllah! Please note:

- All preschool students may attend this field trip: morning and afternoon, 2, 3
 and 5 day students included.
- All students must wear gym shoes and a yellow JNTAC t-shirt.
- All students attending must be present at school at 8:45 a.m. on November 11, and must be picked up at 12:30 p.m. at school. There will be no afternoon preschool session in school on that day.
- Field trip permission slips are due back no later than Tuesday October 10th!
- WE NEED CHAPERONES! We need one adult for every 5 students. With a total of almost 50 students, this means we need at least 10 adults. If you cannot come as a chaperone, but would like to sponsor another adult as a chaperone, please do so.
